LASCHEID COPS TRAVEL CONTEST TOP PRIZE



Dr. William Lascheid of Mt. Lebanon, Pennsylvania was the first place winner in the 1965 Indian Lake Travel Contest according to official statistics released this month by the Lake's management. Robert Lynn Donner of Berlin, Pa. was the runnerup while Mitchell Withrow of Monroeville, Pa. finished the nine month contest in third position. The formal announcement and awarding of prizes will take place at a special contest party, Saturday, January, 29, 1966.

The management of Indian Lake asked the Smoke Signal to thank all of the participants for the enthusiasm and success of the Travel Contest. It was a good contest because of the many people who took part.

FIRST PRIZE

As first-place finishers, Dr. Lascheid and his wife, Sally, are eligible for an all-expense paid vacation of either: 23 day European Tour, 23 days in Hawaii, 3 week Caribbean Cruise, 3 week Mexican Vacation or 3 weeks in West Indies. They will be able to take the trip when they choose. There is no deadline on the prize.

SECOND PRIZE

THIRD PRIZE

First, let's look at equipment. Skiing with the properly designed equipment is a most enjoyable sport. Without it, control is lost and consequently, enjoyment declines.

Your equipment need not be extremely expensive. Such goods provide 'pride of ownership' but are no guarantee of success. You can enjoy skiing just as much with lower priced equipment provided your skis, bindings and boots are of good quality, design and fit. You should have no problem finding good equipment within your budget.

Skis and binding are the medium by which you control your turns and downhill runs. If boots and bindings fit and are not loose, your skis will respond properly. If your skis have good steel edges, good camber, balanced construction and flexibility to match your weight, they will respond properly. Try this sport this winter. You'll like it.

CHRISTMAS AND NEW YEAR'S PARTIES BOOMING SUCCESSES


The Lodge's December 18th Christmas Party was attended by a large crowd intent on having a good time. And they did! The New Year's Eve Party . . . well, it was just great.

Four Indian Lake Gun Club shooters were given awards for outstanding performance at a banquet, Friday, December 10, in the Lodge.


