

NEW INTEREST



PAVING PROGRAM NEARS COMPLETION

SECURITY MEASURES NOW IN EFFECT



To both the visitor and the resident, the increased security measures at the Lake are more and more evident. Each week-end for the last couple of months there has been a uniformed policeman on duty to screen the traffic on the reservation's roads.

This increased activity is designed to discourage unnecessary traffic and as a means of keeping track of the many visitors who come by, giving

them a marker for their cars.

When the policeman is not at the main gate on rt. 160, he patrols around the Lake. Through this, he is able to keep an eye out for any trouble spots, either natural or man-made which might be developing.



When it comes to dancing, Bill and Sally combine on the dance floor to form a very "swinging" couple. They probably pursue this sport with as much fervor as any other.



Dr. Cooper first became associated with Indian Lake when he conducted an extensive amount of research on the Indian Lake watershed a few years ago. At that time the study was conducted to determine the suitability of the Lake as a habitat for aquatic life. This initial study led to the fish-stocking plan and stream improvements which were finally adopted at the Lake.
