MEMORIAL DAY GOLF CLASSIC



IT'S IMPORTANT

BOAT SAFETY


Indian Lake was developed to insure those who live by it's shores an abundance of water fun with a minimum of restrictions. Freedom to use the lake as you please for boating, swimming, fishing or water skiing is an important part of the entire concept of our second-home community and it is imperative that such freedom not be limited because of a lack of safety it could possibly initiate.

Residents therefore are urged to promote their own sensible safety regulations in conjunction with the use of a boat along with observing the minimal standards set forth by state law. It is suggested that boat owners follow a code of safety and courtesy toward all skis, swimming or fishing.

Here are a few good suggestions on water-courtesy that will insure safety and good will if followed and it is hoped they will become a standard part of the code of neighborliness that exists at Indian Lake.

- Don't pass slower craft closely at high speed. A strong wash of waves from your wake could upset an unsuspecting craft abeam of you.
- Pass fishing parties in boats at a good distance so as not to spoil their sport with rough water conditions.
- 3. Be extremely careful when approaching a boat with a water skier in tow. If the skier is intent upon his sport he may not see you and make a wide turn from the towboat's wake into your path. A wide berth is always advisable.
- Be ever alert to spot swimmers in your path. It's hard to see someone if only his head is above water, so always keep a sharp lookout, especially near shore.
- 5. If yours is a power craft be prepared to offer the right-of-way to sailing vessels and canoes. It's much more difficult for them to maneuver out of your path than it is for you to make clearance for them. Be a sportsman.

- If you spot another craft obviously disabled in the water, stop and offer your aid. Even if it isn't needed the thought will always be remembered by your neighbors.
- Don't dispose of waste overboard especially non-sinkable items like bottles, picnic utensils, paper bags and the like, Let's all help in keeping our lake clean.
- 8. Try to avoid stopping your craft at major water intersections or towing skiers through the path of the same. Nothing is more unseemly or frustrating than getting into a traffic jam in the middle of the lake!
- Don't leave it to your youngsters to make sure the proper safety equipment is aboard when they are using the craft alone. Check it yourself you'll feel better and they'll be safer.
- Be a good "skipper at all times. Follow the established "Rules of the Road" and observe the Pennsylvania Small Boat Safety Regulations.


DIP AND DINE PARTY

FOR KIDS ONLY


PONTOON BOAT CRUISE
