Specify Room With Reservation


When making dinner reservations it is important to specify either the banquet room or main dining room. After one room is filled, no more reservations can be accepted.

The tournament will be played under a one-half handicap. To establish a handicap for the tournament, golfers must have scores for at least 54 holes recorded with the pro shop.


Butler Defending Champ

Pittsburgh Press Golf Editor Talks About Palmer's Design of New Indian Lake Course

(Ray Kienzl, Pittsburgh Press Golf Editor, wrote this account of Arnold Palmer's design of Indian Lake's new 18-hole championship golf course. The article appeared in the May 5 edition of the Pittsburgh Press and is being reprinted in The Smoke Signal with Mr. Kienzl's permission).

Anybody who has ever hit a golf ball probably harbors a desire to design a course of his own.

How many times have you driven in the country and spotted some land that immediately made you visualize how it would look with a golf course on it?

As a man who has played courses throughout the world, Arnie Palmer is one of those dreamers. And two years from now he will have his ideas of what constitute a good course right out in the open where everybody can see them.

Palmer, the architect, already is in the midst of his first project, the course at Indian Lake, a resort in Buckstown, 13 miles east of Somerset.

The planned 7000-yard layout will be unique in several ways:

V None of the fairways will be adjacent, the holes trailing each other Indian file in the form of a figure eight.

V An airport is situated in the middle of the back nine with a tunnel running under the airstrip from the No. 13 green to the No. 14 tee.

V Several holes will have a tree or trees right smack in the middle of the fairway.

Why the trees? Palmer was asked.

"I just wanted to see what it would be like," he answered. "I left them in because once you take them out you can't put them back. You can cut them down in five minutes."

Jim McIntyre, an engineer who lives in Friedens, Pa., and one of the four developers of Indian Lake, was responsible for getting Palmer to undertake the project. It took a little doing.

Arnie Finally Convinced

"He thought we were interested only in using his name," said McIntyre, "until I convinced him we really wanted him to do the job. I think he intends to pattern it after Wentworth in England, which he said from end to end was the best golf course he had ever seen."

Palmer denies he ever said that or that he is using Wentworth as a pattern.

"I'm not using any course as a pattern," he said. "But if it will resemble any course, it will be Augusta National (site of the Masters). It will be long and narrow with no rough. The fairways will go right into the trees."

More than half of the holes on the back nine were sculptured and seeded last year, Palmer fitting them into the natural wooded contour of the land. The entire course is expected to be ready for play in 1970.

What has been unveiled so far is a little frightening for anybody unaccustomed to hitting long, straight drives.

No. 10 measures 540 yards, No. 11 is 440, No. 12 is 200, No. 13 is 360, No. 14 is 400, No. 15 is 160, No. 16 is 400, No. 17 is 360 and No. 18 is 540. And the drive off the tee calls for precision, which may be asking too much of the community's home owners and hotel guests who will play the course.

Besides the ever-present trees along the sides, No. 10, 11, 13 and 18 have trees in the middle of the fairway, either in the driving area or at the dogleg leading to the green. No. 11 green will be open only on the left with water and sand guarding the other sides.

Course No Ego Builder

It will be no course to build the ego of members or guests, but it should be one anybody would want to tackle.

McIntyre's partners are William Baltzer, a contractor from Shanksville; Robert Long, a heavy equipment owner from Central City, and James Neilan, an engineer from Somerset.

They have the equipment and Palmer takes advantage of it. For instance, on one of his frequent trips to the layout last year he had the No. 10 green torn up and reshaped, giving it more roll and at least four good pin placements, his plan for

At Augusta every green has four pin placements and maybe someday Indian Lake will have a tournament of its own. Already they're dreaming.





Improvement Adds to Challenge





Golf Course Tunnel Installed Under Airport Runway







Construction of the new Arnold Palmer designed 18-hole championship golf course and new 4,000-foot paved airstrip at Indian Lake in Somerset County made a major advancement with the installation of a 120-foot long tunnel that will be used by golfers to safely travel under the runway as they move from No. 13 green to No. 14 tee. The tunnel was installed underneath the northeast end

of the existing 3,000-foot runway and main taxiway to the new airstrip.

At 5-feet, 10-inches wide and 8-feet, 2-inches high, the tunnel will accommodate motorized golf carts. The inside bottom of the tunnel will be paved.

The 20,400-pound tunnel casing, made of 12-gauge corrugated structural steel, was put in place with the aid of a 6-yard dragline from Robert Glessner, contrac-

tor for the new runway.

Arnold Palmer designed the course so that the back nine holes would completely surround the airport complex. Construction of the new golf course began in 1966. It is expected to be completed by late 1970.

Construction of the new 4,000-foot paved runway is scheduled for completion this summer.
