Progress Being Made On Boro Ordinances

Allegheny Mountain Lakes, Inc., and Indian Lake Borough held a special meeting Friday, January 13, on proposed ordinances and building codes for Indian Lake.

Recommendations for the formal regulations were made by Allegheny Mountain Lakes, Inc., based on the contents of Deeds to lots sold to date. This is the logical starting point as the Deed represents a contractual arrangement between lot owners and the corporation. Detailed maps were presented along with recommendations for zoning in terms of recreation and residential areas.

The plans and recommendations, which included some thoughts on a proposed budget, were turned over to the borough solicitor to draw up formal codes. Authorization was also given to the solicitor to move ahead and attempt to obtain as much real estate tax money as possible to which the borough is now entitled. Effort is also going to be made through the borough to obtain a more equitable relationship regarding the school district.

The meeting represented the first major step towards taking advantage of the legislative powers of the borough. The borough council, solicitor and Allegheny Mountain Lakes unanimously agreed that the less government Indian Lake has the better off it will be. But, it must take whatever action necessary to enforce all rules and regulations. This is necessary if Indian Lake is to satisfy the needs of everyone.

It was emphasized that the borough must keep three things in mind in conducting their governmental affairs: (1) Indian Lake is private, (2) Indian Lake is primarily a recreation area and (3) Indian Lake's mandate rests with the part-time residents.

Mutual understanding between all parties is certain to keep Indian Lake unique as a community.

Rick McIntyre Wins Giant Slalom Ski Race





Effective July 1

Season Pass Renewal System Revised

A new season pass policy, designed to simplify renewals, will go into effect July 1, 1967. The new policy will establish July 1 as a universal renewal date and all Indian Lake and Lake Stonycreek lot owners must renew their season pass by this date to be allowed free and unlimited use of all Indian Lake facilities. The \$150.00 yearly rate entitles the entire family use of the golf course, ski slopes, swimming pool and tennis court. Without a season pass lot owners and their children must pay the daily green fees, ski tow charges or swimming pool rates.

Prior to this new policy, renewal of season passes was based on the anniversary date of the lot purchase. However, with the overlap in seasons and anniversary dates, and the increasing number of lot owners, this system sometimes resulted in unavoidable embarrassment on the part of the lodge and members.

Being a lot owner does not, and never

did, guarantee free and unlimited use of all facilities. The only exception was for new lot owners the first year. Now, new lot owners will get the balance of the first year free for six months or more up to July 1 if purchase is made between July and January. For less than six months the new year will be billed on the difference depending upon what month between January and July lot purchase was made.

This new renewal system will help make Indian Lake an all-around better place to play by guaranteeing the best possible maintenance of all facilities.
