Season Pass Becomes More Popular With Lot Owners

The improvement program started last year by Indian Lake and the continuing confidence expressed by lot owners through an increase in new cottage construction starts are making the season pass for free and unlimited use of Indian Lake's year 'round recreational facilities more popular than ever. All the improvements made are not directly related to the season pass nor does the increase number of lot owners with cottages have a direct relationship, but the two combined make the season pass a convenience for enjoying the facilities while enhancing the value of all property.

Included among the more recent improvements made at Indian Lake are the hiring of a chef at the Lodge, a new water storage system, new equipment to take better care of the recreational facilities, and the introduction of an all-inclusive season pass to include the resort's two golf courses. The confidence expressed by lot owners through new cottage construction starts is greater than ever. Some of this confidence is reflected in the number of custom designed second-homes, many by architects.

As these and many other improvements continue, the task of development nears completion, and the more pleasant job of satisfying lot owners takes over. All factors are now making the season passes more popular than ever. The new membership year, 1969-70, began June 1. If you haven't mailed your check, do so today.

Improvements Continuing On Service Corp. Water System

Improvements are presently being made to the water system which serves the east side of the Lake.

A completely separate system for the Lodge is in process and will be installed as soon as final approval is received from the state, which has jurisdiction over the Lodge's water supply. This will eliminate the present demand by the Lodge on the Service Corporation water system.

Among the other improvements to the water system on the east side is the installation of a 20,000-gallon underground water storage tank. Plans also call for an additional 20,000-gallon tank to be installed on the peninsula, and to connect it with the present east side system to provide a total water storage capacity of 40,000-gallons.

Because of soil characteristics in the development, is is sometimes difficult to provide well water free of iron. But once the new systems are in full operation, the Service Corporation will eventually abandon those wells which tend to be high in iron content.

Improvements to the water system are being completed as fast as available work force permits. Now, lot owners may purchase a season pass for \$300 and have unlimited family privileges on the back nine of Arnold Palmer's championship golf course on the peninsula, the 9-hole course next to the Lodge, ski slopes, ice skating pond, tennis court and the heated indoor swimming pool.

For \$200, lot owners enjoy unlimited family privileges on all recreational facilities except the Arnold Palmer golf course, where a daily greens fee is required. Weekdays, the fees are \$4 for nine holes, or \$6.50 a day. Saturday, Sunday and Holidays, the fees are \$5 for nine holes, or \$8 a day.

Fairway lot owners, whose season pass is mandatory and fixed-in-cost by their Deed, will continue to pay their present rate and enjoy unlimited family use of all facilities.

Fees for guests of fairway lot owners, season pass holders and hotel guests are \$5 for nine holes weekdays, or \$8 a day. On Saturday, Sunday and Holidays, it is \$6 for nine holes, or \$10 a day.

Added Benefits

Each season pass holder, in addition to unlimited family recreational privileges, is permitted to bring another family to Indian Lake as guests four times a year - once each quarter - to enjoy the recreational facilities without charge. All that's necessary is to register guests at the Lodge.

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Golf Cart Policy

As previously announced, restrictions in the leasing arrangements for golf carts make it impossible to handle or permit private carts to be stored on either of Indian Lake's two golf courses. However, individuals who hold a current season pass may purchase a cart license for an annual fee of \$80 and be permitted, along with members of the family, to use their private cart on either of the two golf courses.

Use of private carts by other than family members should be discouraged. If other than family members use the cart without a member present, they must pay the normal cart rental fee of \$7.50 for 18 holes and \$4 for nine holes.

Opening Date For Peninsula Course To Be Announced

There's been no decision made yet on when the back nine holes of the Arnold Palmer championship golf course will open for play.

The greens crew is manicuring the course daily, but because of snow mold from last winter and slow drainage this spring onseveral holes it would be unwise to open the course until these holes recover and are in good condition.

Mcanwhile, golfers are swinging away on the 9-hole course and continue to praise its condition.

More Fish Stocked

Water Ski Club Meeting June 14

Indian Lake water ski club will hold a meeting Saturday morning June 14, at 11:00 a.m. in the Lodge. Bruce Corna, president, is urging all last year's members and any new comers to attend the meeting.

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Most golfers, even beginners are aware of certain rules and etiquette in golf, but they are always worth repeating. But first, there are certain rules everyone should know about Indian Lake's 9-hole course.

- 1. All golfers must register at the pro shop. You may be asked to show your daily pass any time on the course.
- 2. Monday, Tuesday & Friday
 - a. Property owners, regular and social members and their guests may play at any time.
- 3. Wednesday
 - a. Men's Day. Men are to be given preference in tee-off time.
- 4. Thursday
 - a. Ladies Day. Ladies are to be given preference in tee-off time.
- 5. Saturday, Sunday & Holidays
 - a. No one under 15 years of age may tee off between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m. unless accompanied by an adult.
- 6. Any Day
 - a. Only one person may play out of one bag.
 - b. Fast players must be allowed to play through.
 - c. Players may be required to play in foursomes on busy days.

Here are more basic rules every golfer should know and observe:

- 7. Repair all divots.
- 8. Smooth out holes and marks made when playing out of a sand trap. Use the rakes provided for that purpose.
- 9. Avoid damaging the putting green. Repair (with a tee or similar object) all ball marks.
- 10. Do not drive motorized golf carts on or near tees, greens, or bunkers.
- 11. Do not talk or move while others are playing in your group. Do not stand too close to a player when he's shooting.
- 12. Do not hit your next shot until players in front are out of range.
- 13. When looking for a lost ball, allow players behind to pass. Do not hit until they have played through and are out of range.
- 14. Play without delay. Always be ready to hit when your turn comes.
- 15. After your group has holed out, go to the next tee immediately. Mark your scorecard on the tee, not the green.

If you have a question about the rules, ask Jim Coleman. Remember, etiquette is important and makes golf more enjoyable.
