

AIR PARK GROWING FAST

Construction Under Way On Additional Hangars

24 Students in Flying School

There's something about Indian Lake Air Park besides airplanes and the model condominium hotel room. It could be the friendly atmosphere, qualified instruction, wall-to-wall carpeting, or just the fascinating thought of flying.

Whatever it is, Indian Lake Air Park, in less than a year, is moving ahead with plans for the future. Construction already is under way on the first of four additional hangars.

These 32 x 42 foot hangars are being built for the use of private airplane owners who have selected Indian Lake as their base. The hangars will be full sized, and not small T units typical at most private airports. The large frame structure will allow owners to store a boat and car along with the airplane.

Anyone Can Fly

The flying school now has 24 students and all indications are that this will double in a very short while.

There are men, women, boys and girl enrolled in both the ground school and flight training classes.

Dr. Fred Miscoe of Johnstown is the latest student to add another rating to his qualifications as a pilot. He passed the instrument flight test and will probably start working on a multi-engine rating.

The nice thing about flying school is that you progress at your own pace. The 24 students in the Indian Lake Flying School are working on various ratings such as private, commercial, instrument and multi-engine, in preparation for the Federal Aviation Agency written or flight test. The air park supplies manuals.

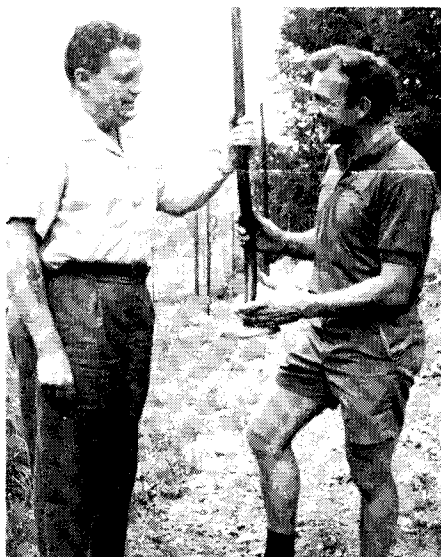

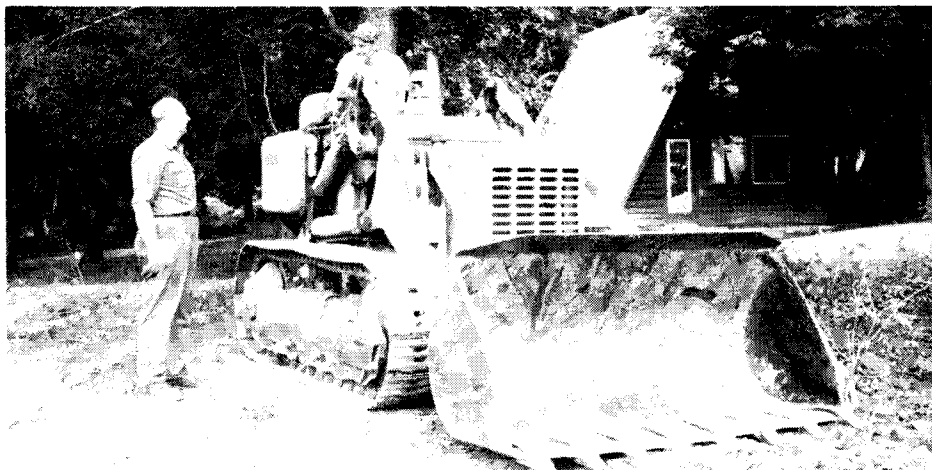

Picture Report of Arnold Palmer's Design

NEW 18 HOLE CHAMPIONSHIP GOLF COURSE

Arnold Palmer is spending more time at Indian Lake now that his design of the new 18 hole championship golf course is taking a more definite shape. Brief descriptions of the back nine holes will be printed in future issues of THE SMOKE SIGNAL. In this way it is hoped that members can share in the enthusiasm Arnold Palmer has for Indian Lake and the new golf course. Plans call for the back nine to be seeded this fall, and possibly be ready for play in 1968.



No. 14 Par 4
400 Yards

The tee shot on this 400 yard, par 4 hole will be the most demanding of any on the back nine holes.

All of the fairways on this championship course are heavily wooded, but on this hole the tree line begins 200 yards down the fairway which means there's an extremely narrow opening in the tee shot landing area. Missing the fairway will probably require chipping back to the fairway without any chance to be on in two.

The remaining 200 yards of the fairway is slightly downhill with a little bend to the left. A good tee shot will be rewarded with something like a 5 to 8 iron shot to the green. A small pond near the left front of the green will catch some stray approaches.



No. 15 Par 3
160 Yards

Arnold Palmer likes to take advantage of existing conditions to design a great golf hole. And this is what he has done with this challenging 160 yard, par 3 hole.

He has created a small lake from an existing stream and pond. Golfers will have to carry this water hazard all the way with their tee shots. It won't be a matter of getting over the lake. The tee shot will have to be accurate because the stream that feeds the lake continues along the right side of the green.

There's a little fairway between the breast of the dam and the green, but not much. The green is slightly uphill and hemmed in on the left and back side by trees.

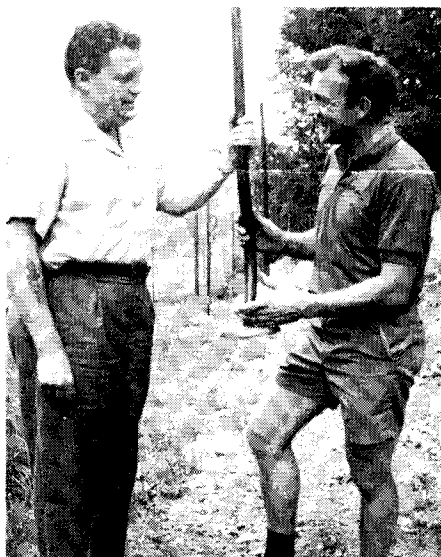

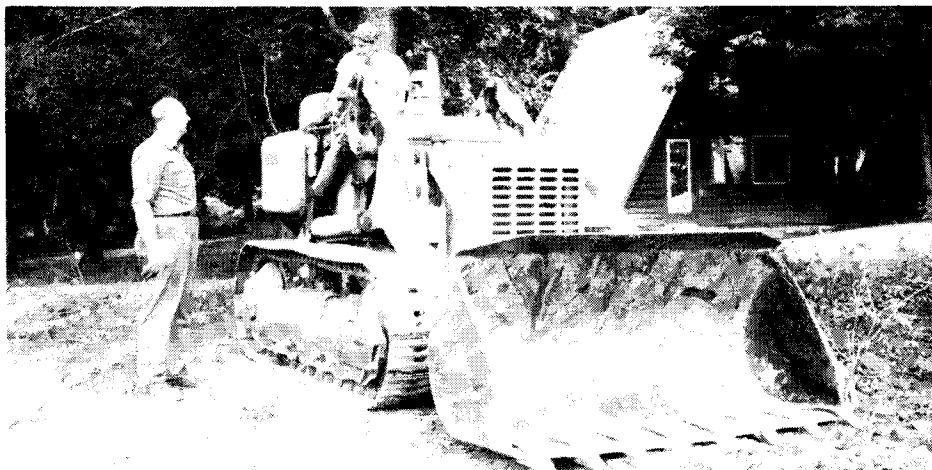

Dr. Cooper Reports

Tests Taken at Indian Lake Show Water Quality Excellent

4000 Fish Added to Stock,

His visit here was timed to coincide with the stocking program initiated recently by the Indian Lake Fishing Club and Indian Lake Service Corporation.

Bass, Calico Stocked

Four thousand fish, ranging in size up to 10 inches, have been stocked in the lake. Included in this new stock are 1500 large mouth bass, 1500 small mouth bass and 1000 calico. The calico was stocked mainly for the youngsters. They can be caught now. Bass will not be ready to catch until next spring.
