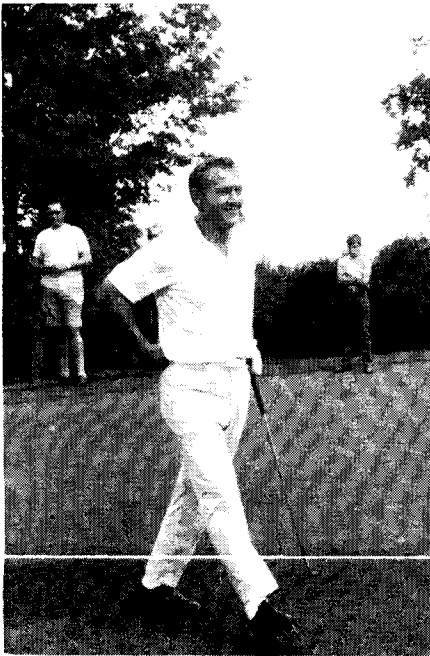

7-Under Par 65

Palmer Breaks Own Course Record In Round With Contest Winners

Teeing Up With Arnie Were Hallo, Changle, Lascheid, Fitch, Poorbaugh and Vanyo



The famous Arnie Palmer smile and stride after sinking a birdie putt was a regular routine Wednesday, September 4 as Arnie had eight birdies and an eagle in posting a record breaking 7-under par 65 in his round with referral contest winners.

Arnie Palmer, golf's all-time leading money winner and designer of Indian Lake's new 18-hole championship golf course, broke his own record by two strokes Wednesday, September 4 by shooting a 7-under par 65 in his 18-hole round of golf with the six referral contest winners.

Palmer had an eagle (on the par 4 No. 7 hole), eight birdies, a bogey and a double bogey in posting rounds of 32-33 for his 65. He still holds the 9-hole course record of 5-under par 31 which he set last year.

Palmer's playing partners in the morning round were John Changle of Bethel Park, Dr. William Lascheid of Mt. Lebanon, and Tussey Hallo of Bridgeville.

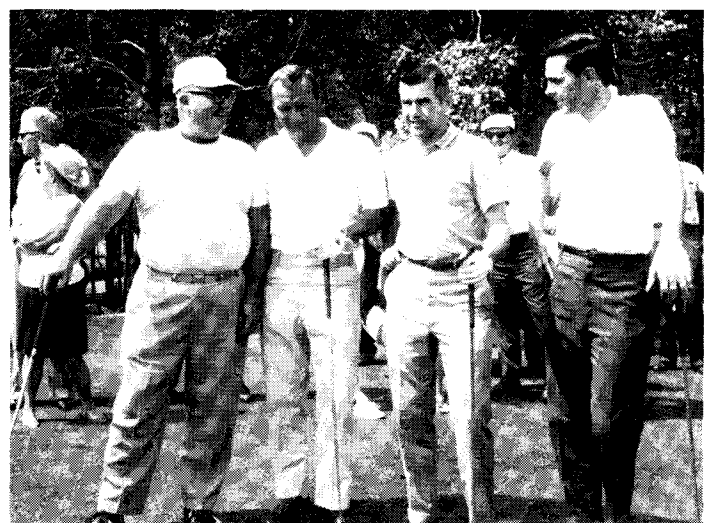
Teeing up with Arnie in the afternoon round were Bill Fitch of Washington, Pa., Jack Vanyo of Johnstown, and Karl Poorbaugh of Somerset. Karl got to play thanks to the contest efforts of his sister-in-law Polly Poorbaugh.

Palmer's 40-foot chip shot for his eagle on No. 7 put him 5-under par after the first seven holes. It appeared certain he would match or break his 9-hole record of 31. But on the par 3 8th hole—"The Monster"—Arnie took a double bogey 5. Not having his four-wood in the bag, Arnie selected

the three-wood. But then he changed his mind and used a one-iron. He hit it short. Arnie then chipped onto the sloping green, and after three putting, he turned to Jim McIntyre, Executive Secretary of Indian Lake, and said: "I'll change this hole for nothing for you." The gallery gave its approval with a resounding cheer.

Contest Winners Play Well

The contest winners played well even though all admitted being a bit nervous. Their best ball in both rounds was good enough to win just two holes. One of these came on No. 3 when Bill Lascheid smacked a beautiful four-iron two feet from the pin. He tapped it in for a birdie while Arnie got a par 3. The only other hole the contest winners won was on No. 8 when Arnie took a double bogey 5 and John Changle had a par 3.

Lascheid and Changle both posted rounds of 40 as did Bill Fitch. Jack Vanyo and Tussey Hallo had 41s and Karl Poorbaugh shot a 43.

With the problem of the possible split between the touring pros and the PGA (Professional Golf Association) uppermost in his mind, Palmer delighted and charmed the gallery with his famous playing style and personality. He exchanged small talk, stopped for pictures, laughed and joked around, and ended the day by taking a boat ride in his new 23-foot cabin cruiser which he launched on Indian Lake a few weeks ago.

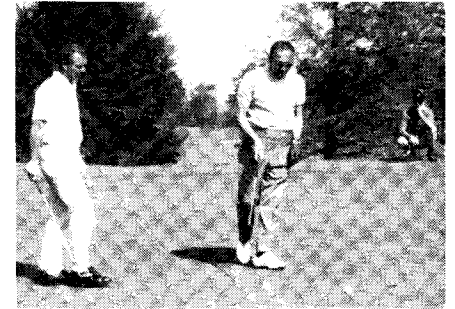

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First Two-time Winner

Parker Wins Golf Championship

Joe Parker of Johnstown fired a final round 3-under par 69 to win the 1968 Indian Lake men's golf championship by a 12-stroke margin over defending champion Francis Cmar of Latrobe.

Parker's 69, which included eagles on Indian Lake's two par 5 holes, and his opening round 75 gave him a 36-hole total of 144. Cmar had 77-79 for a 156.

Parker's victory this year made him the first two-time winner in club championship competition. He won his first title in 1966. Parker, an executive for United States Steel in Johnstown, established a new tournament record this year with his even par 144 total. The old record of 151 was held by Cmar.

Early Competition Close

All twelve golfers in the championship flight were within striking distance of Parker's opening round lead, with the widest margin being eight strokes. Cmar was in the best position at two strokes off the pace, but he shot himself out of contention with a front nine round of

43 on the final 18 while Parker shot a 36. Cmar came back with a par 36 on the back nine but Parker never eased up as he finished the back nine in 3-under par 33.

Jack Butler, who had a final round 77, took fourth place with a 164. Tom Horner finished fifth at 166.

Rounding out the championship flight were Don Landis 168; Dan Swank 169; Jack McKearin 170 and John Legath 173.

Platt Wins 1st Flight

Bob Platt of Somerset took first flight honors with a 36-hole total of 188, three shots ahead of Bernie Nosworthy. Arthur Poorbaugh won third place honors.

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CHAMPIONSHIP SIDELIGHTS . . .

T. O. Smith, 1965 club champion, missed the championship competition for the second straight year, and once again was missed by his fellow golfers. . . Jack McKearin had three birdies in his final round 81. Two were back-to-back at No. 4 and 5. . . Tom Horner was the only golfer to par "The Monster" No. 8 twice. He got one of his pars by snaking in a 30 footer from above the cup. . . Dan Swank carded eight straight 4s for a 37 on the back side of his opening round. . . Ralph Guarino's 3-wood just wasn't working for him Sunday but he believed in finishing the way he started. He had an eight on No. 1 and an eight on No. 9. . . Jim McCracken shot the best final round among first flight players and finished next to last.

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Golfer-Shooter Tournament Oct. 5

Another golfer-shooter tournament, in which golfers who are unskilled in trap shooting compete against trap shooters who are equally as unskilled on the golf course, has been scheduled for Saturday, October 5.

The unique competition, which is open to men and women regardless of shooting or golfing skill, will get underway at 11:00 a.m. with trap shooting at the shooting park. After a dutch-treat luncheon, there will be nine holes of golf. A cocktail party at 5:00 p.m. in the Pub Lounge will climax the big day.

Awards will be presented to the top gun, low net golfer and best combined score. Handicap scoring will be used for both events.

In the tournament held June 15, Billy Baltzer had the best combined score and tied for low net in golf. Don DeArment won high gun honors.

Entry fee, including costs for both trap shooting and golf but not lunch is \$7.50 per person for Lodge members (season pass holders). Fee for non-members and guests is \$10. Entry fee includes cocktail party and prizes.

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TO BEGIN SEPT. 28****New Six-Week Session Open to
Men, Women, Boys and Girls**

A six-week private and instrument pilot ground school will be held at Indian Air-Park for men, women and boys and girls 16 years of age and older.

The school will be conducted every Saturday morning from September 28 to November 2. Instructions will be given from 10 a.m. to 12:30 p.m.

Ground school classes are separate from actual flight instruction and are designed primarily to prepare students for the Federal Aviation Agency's written examination. Students must pass the written examinations before taking a flight test.

Private Pilot Class

There are no prerequisites for the private pilot class. The class material is organized in six sections, beginning with a preview of the aviation field and ending with the FAA regulations. Other sections cover flying preliminaries, flight computer, navigation and meteorology.

Instrument Pilot Class

A private or commercial pilot rating is required for admission to the instrument pilot ground school. Instrument class material covers instrument systems, flight charts, procedures, planning, clearance and approach landings.

FAA & VA Approved School

The flight training school of Indian Lake Aviation, which includes ground school, was approved this year by the Federal Aviation Agency and the Veterans Administration under the Pennsylvania Department of Public Instruction.

Approval was granted by both agencies on the basis of Indian Lake Aviation having qualified to their requirements in the areas of instruction, personnel, facilities, equipment and curricula for flight training and ground school.

Veterans who served in the armed services of the United States for at least 181 days of continuous active duty and had their service terminate honorably after January 31, 1955 are

Platt Wins Junior Golf Championship

Sixteen-year-old Doug Platt of Somerset piled up an early lead with pars on the first four holes and went on to win Indian Lake's junior golf championship by nine strokes over fourteen-year-old Mike Sivulich of Johnstown. Platt had rounds of 40-47 for an 18-hole score of 87, while Sivulich had 49-47 for a 96.

Platt's 15-over par 87 included eight pars and one birdie. Starting off the back nine with a seven shot lead, Platt widened the gap with another stroke on No. 10. It appeared for a while that Sivulich was ready to make his move as he picked up two strokes on the next two holes and cut Platt's lead to six shots after 12 holes. But Platt squelched the charge with a birdie 4 on No. 13 while Sivulich

got a bogey 5. Platt was never headed after this and his par on No. 18 gave him a 9-stroke victory.

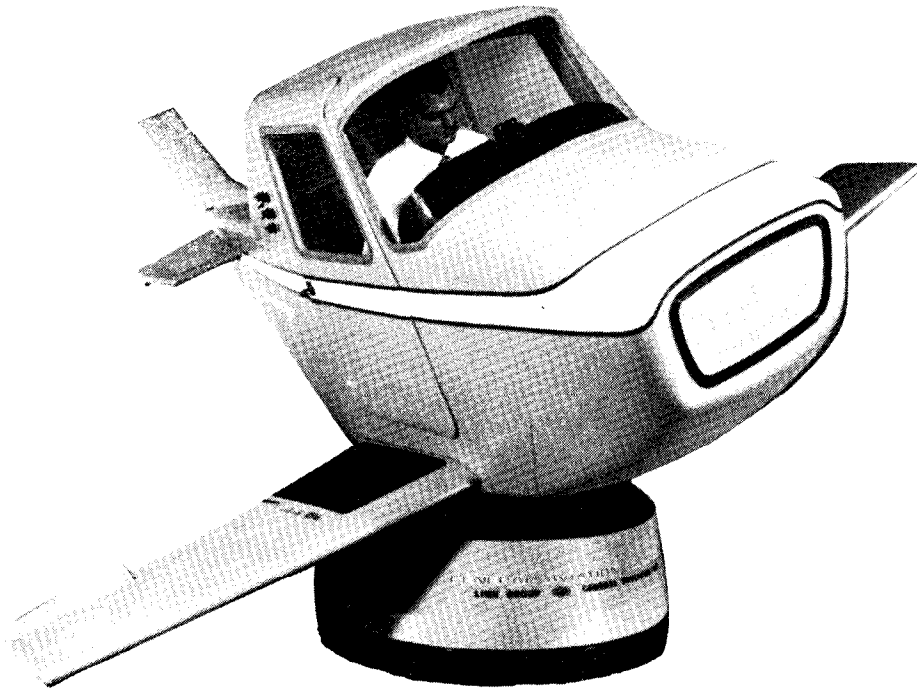
John Deaner won first place in the boys' intermediate group. Eric Braeseker finished second and Bob McKearin third.

Air-Park to Get Flight Trainer



This compact flight trainer, equipped with conventional controls of a typical single engine light aircraft and designed to fly like the real thing, is on order by Indian Lake Aviation and scheduled for delivery in October, 1968. The trainer is designed to allow the student to experience all the dynamic forces and sounds of actual flight.

The panel instruments of the self-contained training unit registers rpm, oil temperature, oil pressure, cylinder head temperature, fuel quantity, altitude up to 10,000 feet and airspeeds up to 160 mph. Other controls included in the cockpit are those for flaps, elevator trim, and mixture control.

The flight trainer is considered to be one of the best educational aids to develop the basic flying skills required of today's pilots. It is also the first general aviation trainer tailored to the pocketbook of the student pilot.
