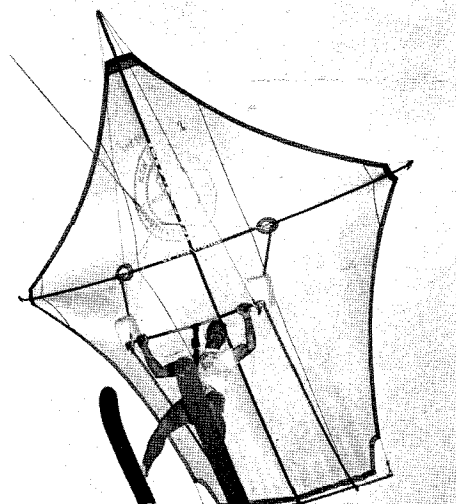
SKI SHOW SCHEDULED

Refreshments will be sold throughout the show. There will be no admission charge but a "free-will" offering will be taken up to help cover the cost of putting this great show on the water.

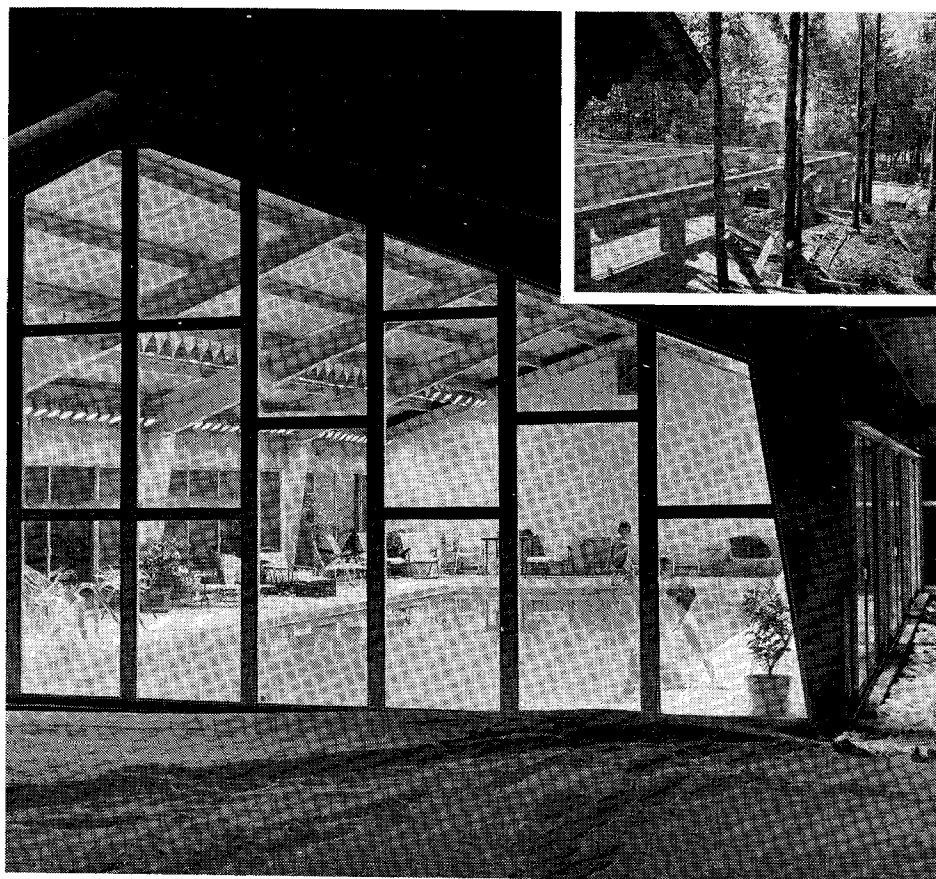

LODGE ADDITION AND YEAR-ROUND POOL

CONSTRUCTION MOVING AHEAD

All plans have been finalized and the construction of the large, new addition to the Indian Lake private Lodge is well underway. The contractors have given the project "top priority" and pulled out all the stops to have it completed as soon as possible.

NOW, YEAR-ROUND SWIMMING

The top feature of this new adjunct to the Lodge is a 30 x 60 foot, indoor-outdoor, heated swimming pool. This large pool will allow swimming to be a year-round thing at Indian Lake and will provide healthy, enjoyable swimming to fun-lovers of all ages and skills.

SPACE PROBLEM SOLVED

The Lodge is being expanded to alleviate the space problem which has arisen out of Indian Lake's rapid growth. In addition to the pool, the new extension to the Lodge will incorporate several other desirable features.

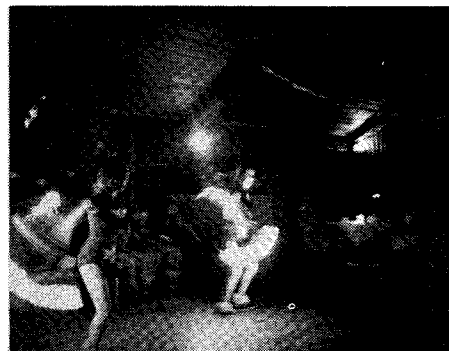

Winchester Franchised

INDIAN LAKE SHOOTING CENTER

OPENING SET FOR AUGUST 28

The opening date for the Winchester Franchised Gun Club, now being constructed on the reservation, has been set for August 28, 1965.

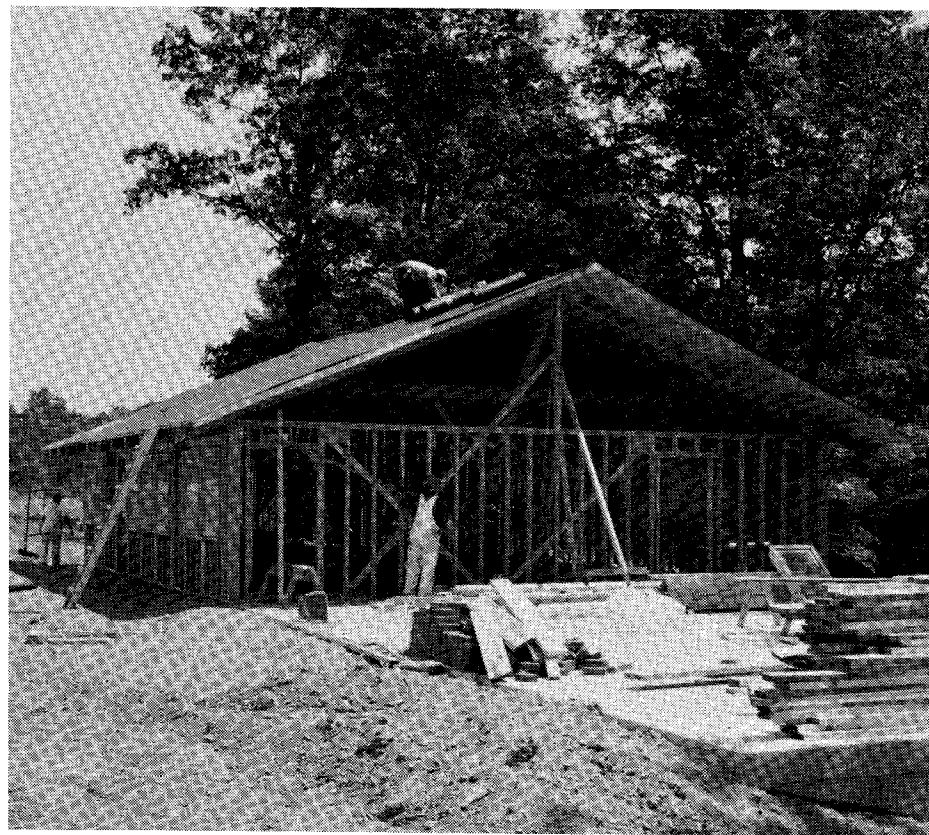
The shooting center is designed to offer a constructive solution to the problem of where to shoot safely.

The complex will include a network of trap and skeet shooting facilities, a 30 x 80 foot Clubhouse and sufficient land for interested gun clubs, sport associations and hunting groups to erect lodge-type structures.

Included with the four trap and skeet fields will be the world's first three dimensional, running deer target. This target, constructed by an independent company, features a motorized figure of a deer on a triangular track. The track is situated in such a manner that the deer will move in and out of the brush. Thus, the shooter will have circumstances similar to those encountered when hunting.

The large, modern clubhouse will shelter a regulation small bore rifle and pistol range on the first floor. The salient features of the second floor will be a Lounge and a gun shop.

The shooting center will be supervised by a Graduate Gunsmith together with a National Rifle Association Instructor.



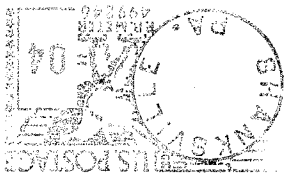
Pictured above is the construction of the new Indian Lake Shooting Center as the complex nears completion. The Center will include Trap and Skeet facilities, Clubhouse and lounge, small-bore range, gun shop, and adjacent land for private groups to build lodges.

Indian Lake Shooting Center is a joint venture of Indian Lake and the Winchester-Western Division of the Olin Mathieson Chemical Corporation. It will be open to the public and will have its own private entrance off route 30, near Reels Corner. Indian Lake Shooting Center is affiliated with the Pennsylvania Trap and Skeet

Association and National Trap and Skeet Associations.

The first experimental Winchester Franchised Gun Club was opened at Thunder Mountain, Ringwood, N. J. in August, 1962. Our Center is unique for Western Pennsylvania and will be a welcome adjunct to the recreational facilities of Indian Lake.

More and more Lake residents are becoming interested in boating and especially in sailing. For many of them boating is a new interest and an activity in which they lack experience. To help the inexperienced sailor may I suggest they consult the annual **BOAT OWNERS BUYERS GUIDE** produced by the Yachting Publishing Corporation, 44th St., N. Y. 10036.

This amazing book retails for \$1 and contains a treasure of information. The newest in all types of boating is at your fingertips. This book, BOBG, not only gives the discriminating buyer a break but is an excellent vehicle of introduction for the boating novice who wants to become acquainted with terminology, equipment, and boating values.

SAILING LESSONS OPEN
