SUMMER'S SURELY GONE



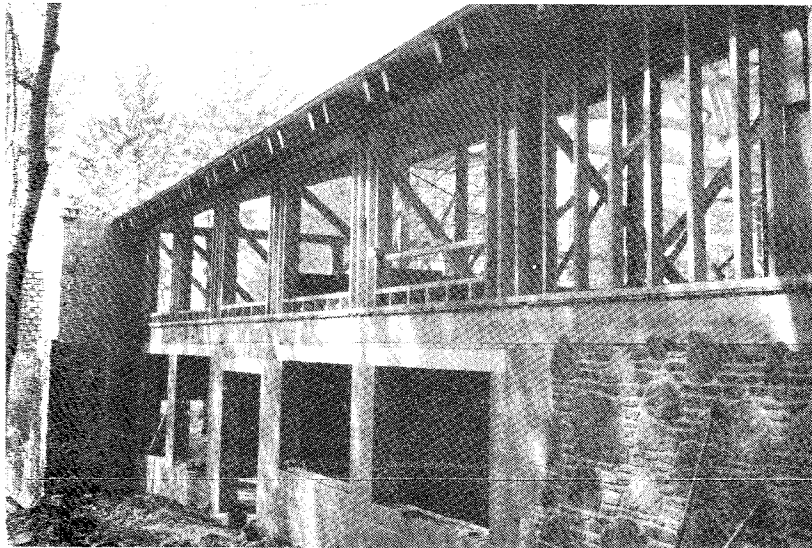

LODGE ADDITION PROGRESSING RAPIDLY

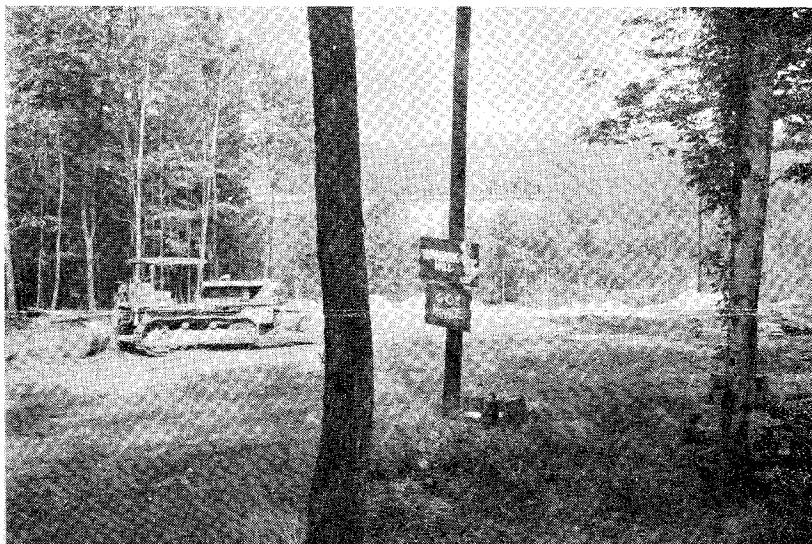


The new addition to the Lodge which includes a year-round swimming pool is rapidly being completed. Workmen are presently involved with the facing of the structure and should move into the interior by the end of October.

When completed the new adjunct to the Lodge will include an expanded kitchen capable of efficiently serving 300 guests, a nursery, locker rooms and a heated swimming pool for year-round relaxation.

Present plans call for completion of the new facilities in late November.

SKI SLOPES IMPROVED



1966 Skiers will be able to enjoy better Skiing at Indian Lake than ever before possible. Construction of improvements to the slopes are now under way and will be completed before the snow falls.

The trees between the novice and intermediate slope will be eliminated. The beginners slope will be graded to increase its length and decrease its grade. This modification will slow it down and make it more suitable for beginners.

There will be more snow making outlets installed on this slope and another tow will be made available.

These improvements are necessary to keep pace with the increasing number of Indian Lake residents who are becoming interested in Skiing for the first time.

Last year was not a good year but all indicators predict a long, hard winter in '66 and this usually means fabulous skiing.

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During the winter season, Willie's ski shop becomes the hub of activity at Indian Lake. Good skier or poor, there are always some gems of wisdom to be picked up from the Pros of the Ski Shop.

One of the requirements of this two-year school, in addition to expert knowledge in the art of ski teaching, is the ability to speak and teach in two foreign languages other than German.

Willie was previously an instructor at the Penny Pitou Ski School in Canton, Massachusetts. This school was headed by Penny Pitou and Egon Zimmerman, former Olympic racers.
