LODGE MEMBERSHIP DUE AND PAYABLE BY JUNE 1

As announced in last month's Smoke Signal, and through a personal letter, the new billing policy on membership privileges at Indian Lake Lodge is now in effect and all \$150.00 full Lodge memberships for the 1967-68 season will be due and payable by June 1, 1967. Pro-rata credit will be given to all lot owners whose paid-up \$150.00 membership extends beyond June 1, 1967.

Indian Lake Lodge was created for the property owners of Indian Lake and Lake Stonycreek. It must, therefore, have support from all property owners if it is to remain exclusive and private.

In accordance with original plans, lodge memberships will not exceed the number of lot owners. However, for every lot owner membership not taken it creates an opening for a non-lot owner social membership. And under this new policy, memberships not taken by June 1 will not be available again until the following year. As stated over and over again, keeping Indian Lake

Lodge exclusive and private depends on the lot owners.

Social Committee Going All Out For the Members

A lively, enthusiastic organization meeting for Indian Lake Lodge's new social committee was held Saturday, March 18, in the Pub Lounge. Bud Woltz, general manager of the lodge, served as moderator and assured everyone that he will follow through on all ideas and suggestions offered to make the lodge more pleasant and delightful for members and guests. However, it was emphasized and unanimously agreed that in order for the lodge to give its members the best of everything, the members themselves must speak up and assist constructively in helping to build more prestige for the lodge.

Lot owners in attendance at the meeting came forth with a wide variety of topics in the form of ideas, suggestions and complaints. Action has already been taken on some of the subjects mentioned such as offering more family style dinners on the menu and banning all parking in front of the lodge. Other

The \$150.00 annual membership fee entitles husband, wife and all dependents residing in the same household unlimited use of the 9 hole golf course, ski slopes, swimming pool and tennis court, plus private social functions.

Without a full membership, lot owners and their children must pay the daily green fees, ski tow charges, swimming pool and tennis court rates. The rates for 1967-68 are as follows: Ski and Golf, weekdays—\$3.50 up to 4 p.m. and \$2.00 after 4 p.m.; Saturday—\$5.00; Swimming Pool and Tennis Court, weekdays, weekends and holidays—\$1.50 for adults and \$1.00 for children.

Use of the golf course and ski slopes on Sundays and holidays will be limited to members with full \$150.00 lodge memberships and their guests.

New identification tags will be issued immediately to all lot owners and their children with full memberships. These new tags will not be transferrable, and there will be a \$2.00 charge for replacing lost tags. After June 1, the red thunderbird tags will no longer be

recognized as admission to the golf course, ski slopes, swimming pool or tennis court.

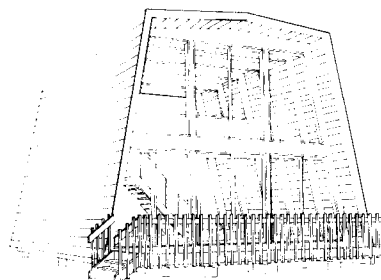
An added feature of this new billing policy is that payment on a full membership can be annually, semi-annually, quarterly or monthly. If paid annually the total membership fee is \$150.00, semi-annually \$152.00, quarterly \$154.00 and monthly \$160.00, based on \$16.00 a month for ten months. Notices have been mailed to all lot owners with a return card to indicate how the membership will be paid.

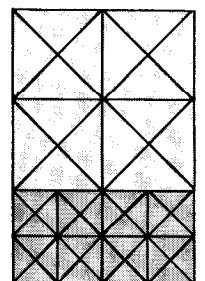

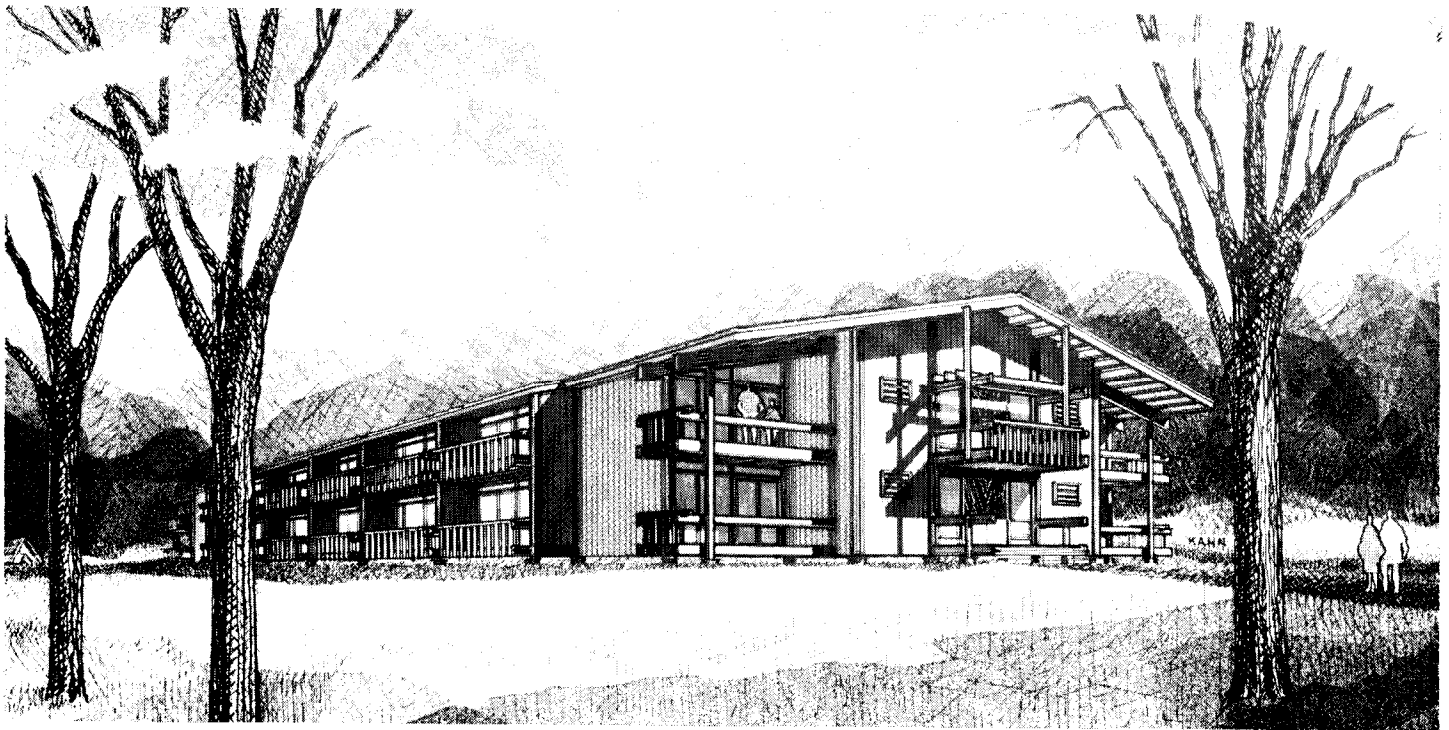

To Be Built As A Condominium

PLANS COMPLETED FOR 32 UNIT HOTEL



Architectural rendering of Indian Lake's new 32 unit condominium hotel scheduled for construction this summer near the present chalets. Room owners will be included in Indian Lake's original plan of only 1500 property owners.

Plans for construction of a 32 unit hotel here at Indian Lake have been completed and construction is scheduled to begin early this summer. The hotel will be situated just below the present chalets. Designed to take full advantage of Indian Lake's beautiful setting, the hotel will provide guests with a magnificent view of the lake from the east and the lodge and 9 hole golf course from the west. Two stories high, the hotel will have six-teen units on each side.

Each room, 14 x 25, will have two double beds, a day-night divan, shower, bath and vanity/sink refrigerator. Parking will be available at each end of the hotel.

The new hotel is being built as a condominium, similar to the Arnold Palmer Island Inns in the Caribbean, in which Indian Lake is actively engaged. Each room will be individually owned. When not in use by the owners, rooms will be rented on a daily basis as an operating resort hotel.

Room owners will have access to Indian Lake's social and recreational activities, as they will become part of the corporation's original plan of only 1500 property owners.

Informal Survey Shows Present Lot Owners Delighted About Plans To Build A Hotel

If Indian Lake has any shortcomings, it is in overnight accommodations. But this problem will be partially alleviated with the new 32 unit hotel which will be built this year. With only eight chalets now available for rental, to say accommodations are limited is putting it mildly.

Indian Lake has over 600 property owners, and over 200 of these have homes built or have one under construction. This means there are still many Indian Lakers who have had to confine their enjoyment of this beautiful resort area to an afternoon or an evening.

Lodge records for the past year clearly indicate a need for more overnight units. Now that plans have been announced, an informal survey among present lot owners has produced a favorable response. Many lot owners with homes already built were delighted with the news—feel they can entertain more guests much more conveniently. And for those without a home built or under construction, they plan to spend their vacations here—feel Indian Lake has more to offer in the way of recreation and relaxation than any other vacation resort.

Buying A Hotel Room Is Attractive As An Investment —You Can Stay In It Yourself Every Saturday and Still Receive Annual Income

The new Indian Lake hotel, as a condominium, offers investors unlimited social and recreation life at Indian Lake, plus a return on invested capital through pro-rata sharing of monthly rental receipts.

You can buy a room for \$10,500.00, and with summer rates at \$17.00 a day, and winter rates at \$14.00, a conservative occupancy rate of 55% should return a net income of \$1,438.00 to each owner for the year.

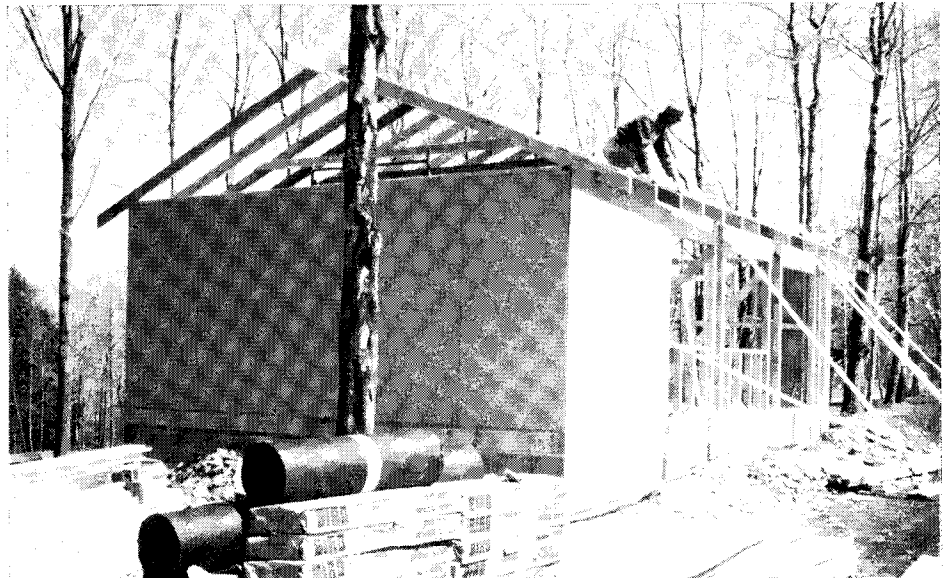
The tournament will be played under a one-half handicap. Golfers must have three or more 18 hole score cards turned in for an established handicap.
